I. PHL 116 Logic - 3 Semester Hours

II. Course Description

This course is designed to help students assess information and arguments. The focus of the course is on logic and reasoning. The student should be able to understand how inferences are drawn, be able to recognize ambiguities and logical/illogical reasoning.

V. General Course Competencies

- A. The student will acquire knowledge of logic as a tool to evaluate formal and informal fallacious reasoning patterns.
- B. The student will understand elementary patterns of logical structures.
- C. The student will understand the usage of different logical structures in resolving fallacious reasoning.

VI. Course Competencies stated in Performance Terms

- A. The student will acquire knowledge of logic as a tool to evaluate reassigning patterns.
 - 1. He/she will demonstrate knowledge of argument forms and distinguish premises from conclusion in any argument.
 - 2. He/she will recognize the difference between a deductive and an inductive argument.
 - 3. He/she will be able to distinguish soundness and validity.
 - 4. He/she will test argument for validity.
- B. The student will understand elementary patterns of logical structures.
 - 1. He/she will apply Aristotelian logic to argument forms.
 - 2. He/she will apply Truth-Functional logic to argument forms.
 - 3. He/she will apply Quantification logic to argument forms.

- C. The student will understand the usage of different logical structures in resolving fallacious reasoning.
 - 1. He/she will identify formal and informal fallacies.
 - 2. He/she will analyze ordinary statements in terms of informal fallacies.

VII. Evaluation and Assessment

Written assessments

Grades will be given based upon A = 90 - 100%, B = 80 - 89%, C = 70 - 79%, D = 60 - 69%, and F = below 60%.

VIII. Attendance

Students are expected to attend all classes for which they are registered.
