I. BIO 201 Human Anatomy and Physiology I – 4 Semester Hours

II. Course Description

This course covers the structure and function of the human body. Included is an orientation of the human body; a study of cells and tissues, joints, the integumentary, skeletal, muscular, and nervous systems; and the senses. Dissection, histological studies, and physiology are featured in the laboratory experience. A 120-minute laboratory is required

V. Course Objectives

By the end of the course, students will be able to

- 1. identify the major anatomical parts using proper terminology and spelling;
- 2. describe the major tissue types of the body;
- 3. relate form to function;
- 4. interpret the physiological basis of common disorders;
- 5. explain the basic physiological functions and processes of the cells, tissues, and organs; and
- 6. explain and evaluate changes in homeostasis.

VII. Evaluation and Assessment
